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FACT SHEET

The mission of Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston (BGCB) is to help young people, especially those who need us most, build strong character and realize their full potential as responsible citizens and leaders.

We provide a haven of safety and opportunity, where adult role models and a variety of programs support the educational, emotional, physical, and social development of youth.

We serve more than 14,000 children and teens, ages 6 to 18, in our 10 Clubs, and through our partnerships with the Boston Police Department and the Camp Harbor View Foundation.

Our approach focuses on six core initiatives: Arts; Education; Leadership; Life Skills; Sports, Fitness and Recreation; and Technology. During the summer, many of our Clubs run summer camp programs for children and leadership programs for teens.

Our growing service network includes Clubs, Camp Harbor View, and a presence in police stations across the city:

Our **10 Clubs in Boston and Chelsea** reflect the communities in which they are located. Some are free-standing facilities; some share space with middle and elementary schools. It is not the type of building that makes them Clubs, but the quality of the staff and the effectiveness of the programs that take place within them. Our Clubs are located in Charlestown (Charlestown Club), Chelsea (Jordan Club), Dorchester (Blue Hill Club and the Franklin Hill Club at the Franklin Hill Housing Development), Mattapan (the Mattahunt Club at the Mattahunt Elementary School), Roslindale (the Sumner Club at the Charles Sumner Elementary School), Roxbury (Yawkey Club and the Dearborn Club at the Henry Dearborn Middle School), and South Boston (South Boston Club and the Condon Club at the James F. Condon Elementary School).

Our **Youth Service Providers Network (YSPN)** places Masters-level, licensed clinical social workers at police stations to provide prevention and intervention services and referrals to the city's high-risk youth and their families. Since 1996, our YSPN social workers have been developing relationships with youth who are at risk for arrest, as well as those who are already part of the Juvenile Justice system, to help young people develop more trusting relationships and offer them choices.

BGCB operates **Camp Harbor View**, located on Long Island in Boston Harbor. The Camp was created by the Camp Harbor View Foundation in 2007 to provide a fun and safe environment where youth could challenge themselves, make new friends and experience a world beyond their neighborhoods, where violence has been on the rise. Programming focuses on four areas: sports & fitness, the arts, leadership development and environmental education. In the summer of 2008, the day camp hosted more than 500 boys and girls, ages 11 to 14, from across Boston. Each camper attended the camp for one four-week session.

BGCB serves a diverse youth population that is 39% African-American, 25% Latino/Hispanic, 19% Caucasian, 2% Asian, and 15% multi-racial or other. Males comprise 55% of the Club membership, with female membership at 45%. During the school year, 50% of members visit a Club at least twice per week; 25% visit at least three times per week. Nearly 49% of members' families have an annual income of less than \$27,000, and nearly 60% of members live in single parent households.

1993	Chelsea Club opens in the Innes Housing Development.
1995	Blue Hill Club / George Robert White Youth Development Center opens in Dorchester at the corner of Talbot and Blue Hill Avenue.
1996	Youth Service Providers Network (YSPN) is established at the District B-3 Mattapan/Dorchester police district; soon establishes a presence in citywide units and at police stations across the city.
1996	The first U.S. community-based Computer Clubhouse opens at the Blue Hill Club.
1999	Ansin Youth Center opens at Charlestown Club.
2000	BGCB opens an after-school program at the King Middle School in Dorchester.
2001-2002	Clubs open at the Bates Elementary School in Roslindale, and at the Mattahunt Elementary School in Mattapan.
2002	Chelsea Club moves to new facility and is renamed the Gerald and Darlene Jordan Club / Kraft Family Youth Center.
2003	Keane Children's Center opens at Charlestown Club.
2005	BGCB assumes management of the Club at the Henry Dearborn Middle School in Roxbury. Blue Hill Club celebrates 10 years of serving the community.
2006	Roxbury Club reopens following a one-year renovation and expansion and is renamed Yawkey Club of Roxbury. The Club now serves an additional 300 members.
2007	BGCB opens a Club at James F. Condon Elementary School. • BGCB is selected to manage new Camp Harbor View on Boston Harbor's Long Island, which will provide summer camp experiences to 600 children annually. • Blue Hill Club undergoes renovation and expansion to serve more youth. • BGCB opens a Club at Charles Sumner Elementary School.
2008	BGCB begins implementation of five-year strategic plan, developed with pro-bono support from Bain & Company, which calls for investment in innovation and impact. • BGCB successfully completes \$100 million Comprehensive Campaign, which funded the Club renovations in Roxbury and Dorchester, allowing us to serve hundreds more youth; provided multi-year operating support to keep our Clubs accessible and affordable over the past five years; and built an endowment to help ensure long-term financial stability.
2009	BGCB opens its 10th Club, a Shared-Space Club in the Franklin Hill Housing Development.

Finances

Club membership costs \$25 per year — just \$5 annually for teens — although the cost of providing programming and services is more than \$2,500 per member. BGCB raises approximately 85 percent of its operating budget annually through private philanthropy.
